



## Omoa Returned Migrant Care Center (CAMR)

### General information

- **Community:** Milla
- **Municipality:** Omoa
- **Department:** Cortés
- **Maximum accommodation capacity:** 86 people

### Overview:

This center is under the General Directorate of "Protection of the Honduran Migrant" as part of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and International Cooperation. On November 15, 2015, the Honduran Red Cross (HRC) began to manage the CAMR-Omoa, through a cooperation agreement signed between the HRC and the Secretary of Foreign Affairs and International Cooperation for the administration and operational coordination of CAMR Omoa.

The CAMR-Omoa is 4.4 kilometers from the border of El Cinchado with Guatemala. This center operates from Monday to Friday from 6am to 2pm and 24 hours a day when required, by a total of 45 people (of whom 15 are HRC volunteers and 9 are HRC staff). The rest belongs to different institutions such as: the National Institute of Migration, the Secretary of Social Development, the Secretary of Security, the Secretary of Defense, the Secretary of Health, and the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR).

The center offers the following services:

- Guidance and Information
- Primary Care in Physical and Mental Health
- Safe Water
- Personal Protection Equipment (PEE) and Personal Hygiene Kits
- Biometric Registration, Identification of Technical Training Needs
- Case Identification of Returned Migrants with Protection Needs
- Restoring Family Links
- Food, Accommodation and Transportation

In the past 7 years, the center has provided services for more than 200,000 people and nearly 2 million care and assistance services have been delivered with an execution of more than L 105,000,000.00 (USD 4.3 million) from SRECI/FOSMIH, IFRC, RC and IOM funds.
